I remember when I was a pre-teen seeing her when my parents and I visited with Uncle Art, and Bep was there too, all of us down in the basement to keep cool on a hot muggy summer day. Most of all are the visits when I would go to the house either before or after one of my many United Airlines O’Hare flights. She loved hearing about my business travels, and I enjoyed hearing about her planned family trips. My wife Carol and I also met with her and Dave at SFO several times as they traveled through for lunch or beverages since we were living in the Bay Area at the time. Sitting in her living room or out on the back patio looking at her family photo albums and hearing her stories of Bep and Dave, especially her job at the bank during the war made deep impressions. On one visit with her I brought a clipping my dad had saved, it was a war time ad for the bank prominently showing her and that big friendly smile of hers. I also shared my amazing find of the handwritten notes my dad made for his toast at their special anniversary. I recall her relating being raised and living in the small building on Waukegan Road. One time she said “You know there were a lot of Bernings around years ago.” I said, Do you remember where they lived?” She said, “Sure, lets drive and I’ll show you.” We got in my car along with my wife and drove around, with her sharing stories as we went. I loved every minute. I’ll miss knowing her and the link she was to people and days gone by.
